## God Loves Justice and Righteousness

- *Mishpat* and *sedeq*, justice and righteousness, as a phrase mean something different than when the words appear individually.<sup>1</sup>
  - In Hebrew, sometimes two independent words joined together with "and" express one concept<sup>ii</sup>— sometimes they appear side by side, and sometimes they appear in parallel verses.
- *Mishpat* and *Sedeq* are used as a word pair around 80 times in Scripture,<sup>iv</sup> including Psalm 33:5, which says that God "loves *sedeqah* and *mishpat*."
- In order to see this one concept of "justice and righteousness," we need to go back to the beginning—to the context of God's *shalom*-filled design for the world.
  - The structure God put into His creation allowed everything in it, including humans, to prosper. Before sin entered the world and distorted everything, everyone had the opportunity to holistically thrive, enjoying the goodness He created.
- Doing "justice and righteousness" means honoring and expressing God's intended order and His ways for life.
- Doing "justice and righteousness" means loving the things that lead to life and actively righting the wrongs that keep people from experiencing life as God created it to be.
- When God does "justice and righteousness," it brings liberation and freedom.vi
- This is why He expects His people to pattern their lives after His ways, because He wants them to experience the free, thriving life full of *shalom* in all their world and relationships.<sup>vii</sup>
- Justice and Righteousness are what:
  - o God loves (Ps. 11:7, 33:5, 37:28, 45:7, 99:4, 146:8; Pro. 15:9; Isa. 61:8; Heb. 1:9)
  - o God delights in (Jer. 9:23-24)
  - o He expects His nation to do (Deut. 16:20, Prov. 21:3, Isa. 56:1, Mic. 6:8, Amos 5:24)
  - He expects His leaders to do (Deut. 16:18, 2 Sam. 8:15, 1 Kings 10:9; Ps. 72; Jer. 7:5, 22:3, 15-16)
  - Jesus will do (Ps. 72, Isa. 11:1-5, Jer. 23:5-6, 33:15-16)
  - o Will be permanent when the Holy Spirit comes (Isa. 32: 15-18)
- Justice and Righteousness are foundational to:
  - o God's reign (Ps. 89:14, 97:2, 98; Acts 17:31; 1 Peter 2:23; Rev 19:11)
  - o God's chosen people (Gen. 18:19)
  - o **Jesus' kingdom and reign** (Isa. 9:7, 16:5, 42:1-4; Ps. 72; Rom. 14:17)

## Demystifying **Biblical Justice**

- The picture of this God who loves justice and righteousness as revealed in Scripture is not a God who loves to punish people, but a God who loves things like this:
  - Relationship
  - When we are completely loyal to Him
  - Freeing the oppressed from the oppressor
  - o When we pattern our lives after His life-giving order
  - o Deliverance, salvation, and victory
  - o Creating a heavenly norm on earth
  - When people are given their rights
  - o Restoring what's been lost, stolen, or broken
  - o Environments where everyone can live in their fullness
  - o Good, unselfish governance
  - o Laws that reflect the value and dignity of the weak and poor
  - o Rescuing the poor and defenseless
